

<p>“Risk Stratification” (Population Health Management and Case Finding)</p> <p>Recipient: Cerner - HealthIntent Ardens – EMIS Templates Abtrace Apex</p>	<p>The Practice performs computerised searches of some or all of our records to identify individuals who may be at increased risk of certain conditions or diagnoses i.e. Diabetes, heart disease, risk of falling). Your records may be amongst those searched. This is often called “risk stratification” or “case finding”. These searches are sometimes carried out by Data Processors who link our records to other records that they access, such as hospital attendance records. The results of these searches and assessment may then be shared with other healthcare workers, such as specialist, therapists, technicians etc. The information that is shared is to enable the other healthcare workers to provide the most appropriate advice, investigations, treatments, therapies and or care.</p> <p>Risk stratification can be grouped into two purposes namely:</p> <p>Direct Care – ‘Case Finding’ where carried out by a health professional (e.g. GPs and Provider) involved in an individual’s care or by a data processor acting under contract with such a provider, it is treated as direct care.</p> <p>Indirect Care - understand the local population needs and plan for future requirement.</p> <p>The source of the information shared in this way is your electronic GP record.</p>	<p>All records held by the Practice will be kept for the duration specified in the Records Management Codes of Practice for Health and Social Care</p>	<p>The processing of personal data is permitted under the following paragraph:</p> <p>Article 6(1) (e) - public interest or in the exercise of official authority.</p> <p>The processing of special categories of personal data concerning health is permitted under the following paragraph:</p> <p>Article 9 (2) (h) - processing is necessary for medical or social care treatment or, the management of health or social care systems and services</p> <p>Related Legislation:</p>	<p>You have the right to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • To access, view or request copies of your personal information; • request rectification of any inaccuracy in your personal information; • restrict the processing of your personal information where: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ✓ accuracy of the data is contested, ✓ the processing is unlawful or, ✓ where we no longer need the data for the purposes of the processing. <p>Right to object: You have a general right to raise an objection to your personal data being shared with the recipient.</p> <p>If you wish to exercise any of your rights please contact the Practice (data controller) or the DPO and your request will be carefully considered.</p> <p>Right to complain: If you are dissatisfied with the way the Practice processes your data, you have the right to appeal/complain. You may raise the issue with the Practice’s Data Protection Officer, contact details are given at section 6, or if not satisfied, with the Information Commissioner (ICO).
